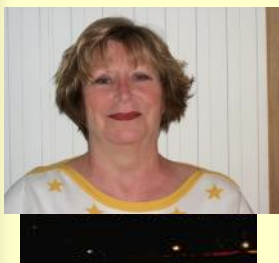

## Amateur Highlight: Liz Sanders

Liz Sanders of Brandon, Mississippi is the proud mother of twin daughters. One is a Lieutenant with the Plano, Texas police department and the other is a Medical Technologist in Alexandria, Virginia. As the Chief Embryologist at MS Baptist Medical Center, Liz has been involved in "making babies" for 21 years now, and still loves every minute of it. She says "I feel so blessed to be part of God's plan for many families."

Having lost her father when she was 12, and being the only girl in the neighborhood, Liz grew up a tomboy. Her two older brothers let her tag along and taught her a lot about fishing. "I felt like the country music song, "Don't Take the Girl." That was me, always wanting to go with the boys." When she grew up, the man she married also liked to fish so their two girls were involved in outdoor activities and also now share that same love of the outdoors.

Liz got started fishing tournaments in April 1999, at Toledo Bend, with the WBFA (Women's Bass Fishing Association). "Oh my goodness what a place to start as a rookie!" Well in April 2000, Liz drew Pam Martin at Sam Rayburn, only one year after starting to fish tournaments. The weather was rainy and windy.

Waves bigger than she had ever seen, dark skies, going down a body of water bigger than any she had ever seen, and having no clue where she was or where she was going. She knew one thing, she was with Pam Martin and she was the best. She and Pam were somewhere (to this day Liz still doesn't know where exactly) in about 5 to 20 feet of water, basically a hump. Liz was throwing a solid chartreuse spinner bait and by 9:00 she had a limit. "I had never caught my limit before and really didn't know what to do." Pam Martin, being the kind of person she is, stopped fishing and found her extra set of culling rings and taught Liz how to cull fish.

"Shortly after that Pam said loudly, "we have to get out of here." She showed me a phenomenon I had never seen before. As she cast her line out it levitated over the water and never laid down in the water. The hair on the back of her neck stood up and she said lightening could strike us any minute. She threw her rod down and strapped it in place. Now, I had heard of this happening before, but I had never experienced it before. If Pam Martin looked scared I knew I should be also. So by now I was getting a little nervous. You have never

seen a rookie move so fast. Like "Jack Flash" I was in my seat, life jacket on and zipped."

Well, the storm calmed down some, and they got wet, but kept fishing. At the end of the day Liz had 10.66 lbs and ended up in 15th place. Pam had 9.58 lbs (giving her a total of 29.67 lbs for the 3 day tournament) and she finished in 6th place. "Being a rookie and getting to fish with Pam Martin, and having the opportunity to catch fish, will be an event I will never forget. As a rookie you are scared to death, and very intimidated, by the Pros on the tour, but Pam was so kind and easy to get along with and made me feel so welcomed, I continued to fish with WBFA and have not looked back since. Surely a day on the water I will never forget."

### **Taxable Income from Fishing by Martha Goodfellow**

\$600 = 1099-MISC No it's not a secret code but, it's something that if you know about, it might save you some money when it comes to tax time next year. Did you know that when you earn \$600 or more from fishing a tournament circuit, your income will be reported to the IRS and you will receive a 1099-MISC for the reportable income?

When I started fishing the lady's trail in 2009, a fellow angler, Monica Altman, shared some great advice. She recommended that I save all of my receipts and record my fishing expenses to offset my winnings.

Some expenses, like tournament entry fees are obvious expenses. But, did you know that the mileage that you travel to and from a tournament might also be deductible? How about the mileage to and from the tackle store for the baits that help you win? I recommend you keep track of the miles you travel. Probably the best way to track your mileage is to make a note of the starting mileage on your vehicle and then the ending mileage.

The best place to look for how much is allowed is to go to [www.irs.gov](http://www.irs.gov). In the "search" area, type "mileage" and look

for articles for current information. Currently, for 2011, you can claim, "51 cents per mile for business miles driven." <http://www.irs.gov/newsroom/article/0,,id=232017,00.html>

I am not an accountant so, I do advise you to check with your tax preparer for how they'd like you to keep your records and what to save. Remember to check back with the IRS web site, or your accountant, to see what the current mileage rates are (Note: in the past, the IRS has made changes to the allowable mileage rate during the year.)

### **Carolina Rigs Shine in Pre-Spawn by Kathy Magers**

One look out the window on a blustery February day makes it hard to imagine ever being able to fish again. Cold water temps leave bass so dormant that enticing a bite can be an all day affair. But what a difference a few days make when weather warms and male bass are followed in waves by egg heavy sows moving into the shallows. Then another cold snap and it all reverses again. That's when anglers discover the value of a Carolina rig in pre-spawn.

Many bass live deep along main lake ledges and at mouths of creeks throughout the winter. As hours of daylight increase, they are signaled to approach spawning areas. They first move to main lake points followed by secondary points found just inside creek mouths. Prime holding areas are

deeper outside edges – along grass lines, deep brush or any available cover. One of the easiest methods of reaching these pre-spawners is pulling a Carolina rigged soft plastic along these deep edges. Productive lures include lizards (natural spawning time enemy) during an aggressive bite or something smaller like a Zoom Centipede when the bite is slow. Dipping the tail in chartreuse dye helps, too.

Look for warming waters near deep points. Avoid shady shallows early - finding instead sun-warmed banks on the north or west side of lake or creek. Fine-tune this by looking for riprap where the rocks soak up the sun's warmth and radiate out into the water drawing baitfish and bass. Find a shoreline that fits the above description and continue to add amenities

bass seek this time of year, like vegetation for newly hatched fry to hide in, a nearby creek providing easy access to the area or brush piles/logs which females rub against to loosen their eggs just prior to spawn. Fish adjacent deep waters, moving shallow only when the water warms. A Carolina rigged soft plastic is productive because it allows the lure to float along freely in a more natural presentation than a Texas rig. This floating presentation often induces a competitive "greed-strike." Consider, too the Carolina weight stirs sand and mud puffs as it scoots along the lake bottom - attracting bass visually. Perhaps most importantly, the noise factor from twitching the rod tip calls inquisitive nearby bass to come out and investigate the commotion.

### Continued: Carolina Rigs Shine in Pre-Spawn by Kathy Magers

Rigging a Carolina rig can be frustrating but it is well worth the effort. Here's how to rig it: Onto the main line coming from your reel, thread a bullet (in grass) or barrel (in rocks) shaped weight of ½, ¾ or 1 oz. Go heavier as the depth changes or wind picks up. Unlike a Texas rig where you're taught to use the lightest weight possible, opt instead for sufficient weight to keep the rig on the bottom while retrieving it so bottom contours can be transmitted back up the line when weight bumps into objects. If you hang momentarily and shake it free, the hit usually comes as your weight and lure are falling.... so be on guard. After the weight (lead or brass) add a bead (plastic or glass) then a swivel. Pair a tungsten, lead or brass sinker with a glass bead for a "brass and glass" rig that makes more noise when rod tip is quivered.

Onto the swivel, tie a 1'-5' leader - most common lengths are from 2 to 3

feet. Using a lighter line weight for the leader encourages it to break before the main line when a hang up occurs. That way, you keep your Carolina Rig" and only lose the leader portion. If I'm using 17 lb. test main line, I use a 14 lb. leader. If I'm using 14lb main line, I might use 12lb as a leader. Add a hook to the end of your leader line – a smaller 1/0 hook allows the lure more action and penetrates a boney fish mouth easier than larger hooks for those who "miss" repeated hook sets. During the spawn, I'd suggest a heavier 3/0 hook. But any hook in the 1/0 to 5/0 range will work. Remember though, the heavier your hook, the more it will weight down your soft plastic lure. Reel drag should be set with firm resistance but not locked down completely, which could cause your line to break.

There are several time-saving products on the market he help anglers assemble the "Carolina rig" faster. Like everyone else,

I too became frustrated with the time consuming chore of re-rigging. After many years of fussing, I finally began toying with several pre-rigged units I had devised. The one I liked best of all saved me so much time, I decided to market it. EZ Rig™ features connecting components pre-rigged onto one short, stainless steel wire. Anglers have the freedom to add their own choice of leader line and hook which should vary depending on water depth, clarity, etc.

If you've never tried fishing the Carolina technique, you might want to consider it. While rigging can be tedious the pay off is well worth the effort. Most guides and pros whose reputations depend fishing success turn to this technique year-round but especially during the pre-spawn. Carolina rigs are in the spotlight now. Take advantage of casting one, and you may end up in the spotlight, too!

## PRACTICE PARTNER RULE Adjustment and Clarification

No surprise, but the LBAA rule dealing with practice partners has been one of the hottest and most inquired about items as we prepare for our first event on Lake Sam Rayburn.

As it currently reads, there are some areas that are not so easily enforceable by our staff. Many discussions have lead to some adjustments to clean up one grey area. The board has had several discussions along with our tournament director Lynn Wilson on ways to make the rule more enforceable across the board.

VII. Practice, letter “f”, is the one we will be adjusting.

At the beginning of 2011:

f. All competitors may practice with immediate family members, regular travel partners or other competitors during the official practice period.

g. Anyone other than an official competitor must be pre-approved by the tournament director and **are to be identified on the official tournament registration form.**

**Beginning MARCH 1, 2011 the wording will be adjusted as follows for letter “ f ”:**

f. Competitors may practice with immediate family/ household members, domestic

household members or another competitor. (official LBAA definition of immediate family is...anyone who is a close blood relative or lives in your house and travels with you to the tournament). Practice partners must abide by the same rules as anglers including not obtaining information related to locating or catching fish from the beginning of the official practice period and extending until the conclusion of the tournament.

Letter “g” is clear., but many are not finishing the sentence to read the part that is bold and underlined in the paragraph to the left.

The lake is created by Hartwell Dam located on the Savannah River seven miles below the point at which the Tagollo and Seneca Rivers join to form the Savannah; extending 49 miles up the Tugaloo and 45 miles up the Seneca at normal pool elevation. The lake comprises nearly 56,000 acres of water with a shoreline of 962 miles.

The state records for South Carolina are: largemouth @ 16

lbs. 2 oz., smallmouth @ 9 lbs. 7 oz. and spotted bass @ 8 lbs. 2 oz.

The state records for Georgia are: largemouth @ 22 lbs. 04 oz., smallmouth @ 8 lbs. 2 oz. and spotted bass @ 8 lbs. 2 oz.
